# Schools and Libraries News Brief

### **Commitments for Funding Years 2009 and 2008**

**Funding Year 2009.** USAC will release FY2009 Wave 17 Funding Commitment Decision Letters (FCDLs) August 18. This wave includes commitments for approved Priority 1 requests (Telecommunications Services and Internet Access) for schools and libraries at all discount levels. As of August 14, FY2009 commitments total over \$697 million.

**Funding Year 2008.** USAC will release FY2008 Wave 65 FCDLs August 19. This wave includes commitments for approved Internal Connections and Basic Maintenance requests at 88% and above and denials at 86% and below. As of August 14, FY2008 commitments total just under \$2.35 billion.

On the day the FCDLs are mailed, you can check to see if you have a commitment by using USAC's <u>Automated Search of Commitments</u> tool.

## **Update on Fall Applicant Training**

#### FCC Broadband and Education Workshop

As part of its work to develop a National Broadband Plan, the FCC is holding a workshop on education that will cover topics ranging from E-rate reform to stimulating innovation in educational research. The workshop will be held on August 20 at 1:00 p.m. Eastern (10:00 a.m. Pacific) at the FCC headquarters, Room TW-C305 (Commission Meeting Room), at 445 12th Street SW, Washington, DC 20554.

The FCC hopes to learn about ways in which broadband can affect education at the early childhood, elementary, secondary, and post-secondary levels in a cost-effective manner. The workshop will look at current programs, such as E-rate, and evaluate how such programs can be improved, for example, to take advantage of new and developing technologies. The workshop will also look at what applications and devices might be used to improve educational performance.

Please visit the FCC's <u>National Broadband webpage</u> to register to attend the workshop in person, learn about how to visit the workshop via webinar, or make specific recommendations to the FCC about the workshop. The event will be broadcast live via WebEx, Second Life, and webbased video feed, and interested participants will be able to submit questions to the panelists via WebEx, Second Life, and Twitter. The Education team is also soliciting ideas for the Plan <u>via</u> <u>Ideascale</u>.
